

Historical Data:

The McLeod farm was one of the most important of the rapid increase of truck farms throughout the South Carolina Lowcountry. The farm began in 1884 when William H. McLeod and his son, Claudius E. McLeod bought land along the west side of the new Port Royal and Augusta Railroad. Claudius McLeod continued to purchase land, including the Keyserling property on the east side of the railroad, into the early twentieth century. This house was originally part of the Keyserling family operation, adjoining the McLeod farm. The McLeods purchased the property in 1921. Served as quarters for workers at the McLeod truck farm.
